

Citation Principles

Moholy-Nagy University of Art and Design (MOME) follows the Author-Date citation and referencing principles of the *Chicago Manual of Style*. Students are requested to prepare the citations for their seminar papers and theses according to the principles and examples outlined below, as well as those available on the official information website: <https://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org/>

Academic papers that do not accurately attribute literature and the ideas of others are unacceptable, as ideas taken without source attribution constitute plagiarism and the unauthorized use of intellectual property. Verbatim quotes must always be enclosed in quotation marks.

In the *Chicago Manual of Style* Author-Date reference system, sources are cited briefly in parentheses within the running text, using the author's last name and the year of publication. Every in-text citation corresponds to an entry in the reference list, where the full bibliographic information of the source can be found. The abbreviated in-text parenthetical citations contain the last name of the author or authors of the cited work—or in the case of databases, research materials, reports, and other documents published by institutions, the abbreviation of their name or project title—the year of publication, and the page number containing the referenced information (except for unpaginated online materials).

The *Chicago Manual of Style* Author-Date system lists authors' names in inverted order in the bibliography, with a comma placed between the surname listed first and the given name that follows (this is naturally not necessary for authors with Hungarian names).

Below is an adapted version—applicable to Hungarian-language texts—of the citation models published on the above-referenced website, categorized by publication type. Books

Single-Author Monographs

Pollan, Michael. 2006. *The Omnivore's Dilemma: A Natural History of Four Meals*. New York: Penguin.

Multi-Author Monographs

Ward, Geoffrey C. and Ken Burns. 2007. *The War: An Intimate History, 1941–1945*. New York: Knopf.

In the case of four or more authors, indicate only the first author in the parenthetical citation, followed by the abbreviation et al. Include all members of the author group only in the bibliography at the end of the text.

Edited Texts and Literary Works (Primary Focus on Editor, Translator, or Compiler)

Book Chapter or Other Section of a Book

Electronic Books (E-books)

For electronic books and other publications published on the internet, state the publishing institution, organization, research group, etc., after the author/editor, publication year, and title, followed by the URL required for download. The date on which the online content was viewed must precede the URL. If the publication has page numbers, include the page number in the parenthetical in-text citation in the same manner as printed publications. If it is unpaginated, attempt to indicate the location of the referenced information as accurately as possible (e.g., chapter number, file number for multi-file publications, etc.). If published in a format designed for e-readers, specify the publisher, year of publication, and format type.

Articles Published in Periodicals

Articles in Printed Periodicals

The volume/issue number follows the title of the journal. Journal issue numbering varies greatly: many journals number continuously from the first issue, while others restart every year. The main rule: provide the serial number displayed on the publication as the issue number. If issues are bound into volumes, provide the volume number.

Articles in Online Periodicals

If the article has a DOI identifier, include it at the end of the citation (after indicating the date accessed).

If the article does not have a DOI identifier, provide the URL required for download.

Articles in Newspapers, Weekly/Biweekly Magazines, or Other Magazines

Articles published in newspapers, weeklies, biweeklies, or other magazines are cited similarly to academic periodicals, but state the publication date rather than issue numbers. If citing an online version of the publication, provide the URL.

Website

For research materials, reports, statements, and databases not attributed to individuals, begin the reference with the name of the institution, organization, research group, etc., that maintains the website (and releases the material), along with the year of publication. Follow this with the title of the project or research material, the date last accessed, and the URL.
